2009 JWOC - Joshua Blatchford joined a select group of club members that have represented Australia at World Championship level, by gaining selection in the Australian team for the Junior World Orienteering Championships, contested in Trentino, Italy. A notoriously hard self marker he was a tad disappointed with his efforts but was consistently one of the best performed of the entire Australian team.
