## Presidents Report

MARCH 2011

This year I've decided to finally end that tradition. Basically it's dead and buried. A lot of people might say "if it aint broke then don't fix it", but I'm not sure if this ploy has actually been working. Hang on was that a quote sneaking in there? I think it was and what's worse is the fact that I think it was used in my 2005 report. At least if it's recycled I probably haven't increased my carbon footprint too much. Oh well lets get on with it....

### General

2010 was a year of bum up - head down, and with a lot of time & attention spent on the detail, we may have been a little less focused on the big picture. In 2011 we hope to take a closer look at how our club is run and where improvements can be made. That's not to say we haven't been doing things right. We are one of NSW leading clubs on many measurable parameters, but that's not to say there isn't room for improvement. Earlier this year the club executive meet over two nights to discuss how we might tackle this task in the attempt at further enhancing the orienteering experience for all of our club members.

One of the early outcomes of this process is the "mapping workshop" set down for 16th April. This workshop will be an opportunity for some of our current mappers to impart some of their knowledge on to the next generation of map makers. One of the other many initiatives is "course setter workshops" which will give the less experienced an opportunity to learn the theory of course setting and the ideals one strives for in this undertaking. There was also a suggestion that club members may wish to take up stewardship of a nearby mapped area. The steward would check the area for changes (tracks, vegetation etc) to ascertain it's current suitability as orienteering terrain and do so at reasonable intervals. This would allow for

regular map updates such that "surprises" weren't discovered closer to actual event dates. More details about these and other initiatives will be forthcoming throughout the year.

### Financial

Whilst we are in a strong financial position it must be mentioned that the forecast budget for 2011 is in deficit and an increase in event fees must be considered at the AGM.

### Performances

#### 2010 WOC

Our "remote" club member Rob Preston has never been far off selection as an Australian senior representative and in 2010 he finally cracked it for a berth on the team competing at WOC in Trondheim, Norway. Congratulations Rob, well deserved after years of outstanding performances. Rob also competes at world level in adventure racing and achieves feats of endurance that we mortals could not begin to comprehend.

#### 2010 JWOC

Joshua Blatchford was once again selected as a representative for Australia at Junior World Championship level. This time he competed in Aalborg, Denmark. He then spent several weeks in Norway training and competing whilst being hosted by a local family that Bjorn Mella had put him in contact with. This was a great experience for Josh providing him with not only a great orienteering opportunity but a fabulous life experience where many new friendships were forged. Josh proved that this Scandinavian training was beneficial as he took out the Men's Junior Elite category in the prestigious Australian Long champs at Tanunda Creek, SA in October.

#### "Darby Munro Award"

This was only the second presentation of this award and I must say that the recipient, Greg Bacon was a deserved

winner. Greg's enthusiasm and workload shone throughout the season with mapping, course planning and organising activities spread throughout the bush and street seasons. ## Mapping Workshop

Sat 16<sup>th</sup> April

*This workshop, with input from Ian Dempsey, Denis Lyons and Russell Rigby, is designed for inexperienced orienteering mappers who want to learn basic mapping skills. However, more experienced mappers are welcome to attend to share their expertise.*

**Venue:** 138 Tirriki St, Charlestown and bushland at Whitebridge

**Time:** 10am sharp to around 3pm  
2-hour theory session in the morning - 2 hr practical activity in the afternoon.

**Notes:** At the end of the day, participants will have

- Been introduced to basic mapping techniques for orienteering
- Used those techniques to map some local bushland.

You'll need the following things

- A mapping board around 30 x 30cm. This needs to be firm but lightweight and could be Masonite, Perspex or polystyrene (the latter covered with adhesive sheet).
- Mapping pencils that roughly correspond to an orienteering map's main colours of black, brown, blue, yellow and green. Clutch action pencils with 0.5mm coloured leads are good, but sharp coloured pencils can also work.
- A baseplate or thumb compass, a short ruler, an eraser and masking tape.
- Lunch.

You can bring a GPS unit that reads grid refs from a topo map, but it's not essential.
